

Checks or money orders for the Raffle should have a notation of "gift" on them – ONLY, as the Banking Industry is also under these same rules.

A.M. Pet tips

Combine your morning exercise with your pets — studies show that both walkers and runners are much more likely to keep at it with a canine pal. Even if your dog is too old or petite for your morning miles, she can join you outside while you stretch or cool-down around the block.

As for feeding your pet, the smartest and most efficient way to feed dogs and cats is to "get rid of their food bowls, and feed them from a durable rubber toy (like a Kong) that is stuffed with their normal food ration," says Andrea Arden, a NYC pet trainer. "That way, your pet is expending mental and physical energy 'hunting' for toys." And it's a timesaver too, because you can prefill a couple at a time and put them in the fridge.

Again – thanks to everyone – it was a great weekend. Gabbe & Lyndell Penney (far left)



Start your hunt for the perfect spot!

Questions started before Mingle 2011 was barely over — How do we pick where to have Mingle? How about...? It isn't just a case of...? I think that Lost Lodge has been a good 'fit' because we went to great lengths to learn all we could before we committed to that venue. But we've been there twice and, as much as we love Lost Lodge, its time to broaden our horizons.

Orlando has been mentioned; along with Las Vegas, the Poconos, the Adirondacks, the Eastern Sea Coast, New England, Rockies, Gulf Coast, the Outer Banks, the Great Lakes, and Oregon. I like the idea of a country setting but someone might find a perfect urban setting – the field is open to your imagination and creativity.

Just set your mind to it - it's got to be a careful and thorough search. You need a place that:

- Accepts pets multiple pets without sky high pet fees! Some places will tell you, 'Oh, we will gladly accept your pet — \$100/ head, per night — non refundable.' That does not say pet friendly to me! Please understand, in the past we've had 36 to 60 dogs in attendance!
- Reasonably close to public transportation – airlines, generally; most bus and trains do not accept pets.

- 3. Can accommodate 50-75 (or more) humans in all sorts of room combinations, friends, spouses, friendly strangers, families, and room mates, in lodges, cabins, hotel, and RV facilities. And allow for some sense of community.
- *4. Cooking and picnic facilities* are a plus. A pavilion would be great.
- 5. You are going to have to make an onsite visit. Emails and phone chats can sound just lovely but, as we found out the first year of Mingle when we almost started booking a lodge – all the beds were bunk beds! Thank goodness Joyce Young paid a visit to that resort and then to Lost Lodge.
- 6. An Inn Keeper interested in animal welfare is also a very big plus! If they offer reduced rates for a 501c3 charity so much the better. Dona & Mike Howard (owners of Lost Lodge Resort in KY) have agreed reluctantly to provide references for us to any other inn keeper. Dona has threatened to give us poor references so we will come back for a 3rd year.

Venues in question

Once you've found a place – or places – that seem to fit the criteria, you need to collect all the info you can – brochures, websites, personal references; then build a little 'presentation' for the Mingle Committee. You need to have a general overview of the property, rates, policies, points of interest, restrictions, etc.

The PA folks had a get together in the Poconos in 2009. Maybe Mary and Peggy will find something special way 'up yonder.' I KNOW there are gorgeous places in Minnesota.

About Feb. 1, an invitation will go out to join the Mingle Committee. At that time the first items of business will be date & place. And if your place is selected, you'd better plan on being on the committee!

Turkey bones spell trouble

It's the day after Thanksgiving or Christmas and the phone at the clinic rings all day with calls from concerned pet owners: "My dog has diarrhea," "My dog has diarrhea with blood," "My dog is vomiting," or "My dog isn't eating." These all too common scenarios share one cause. A few days earlier, someone threw turkey bones away in a garbage can that wasn't tightly shut, or a well-intentioned doglover decided to feed the bones to the dog.

Bones – scrape, puncture, or block

Turkey bones - whether they have meat on them or not - are dangerous, and should never be given to dogs. Any sharp point on a bone can scrape and cut your dog's gastrointestinal tract from the esophagus down to the rectum, causing damage on its way in or out. A sharp bone can even cause a perforation in your dog's tract. Bones may also get stuck in part of the tract and cause a blockage that does not allow food to pass.

If a blockage has occurred, your pet will vomit most of what he eats or drinks (if he is eating and drinking at all); he will act depressed and lose weight if enough time is allowed to pass. A blockage that is left untreated can lead to perforation or tissue death of

part of the gastrointestinal tract. Shock and, eventually, death may result if a blockage is left untreated.

Even if a bone doesn't result in a blockage, it can still cause perforation of part of the gastrointestinal tract or an internal abrasion. If your pet has an abrasion, he may vomit (possibly with blood) and may have diarrhea (also possibly mixed with blood) and a decreased appetite.

If a perforation has occurred, your pet will be extremely ill - lethargic, reluctant to get up, unable to get comfortable, and surly about GOBBLE ... GOBBLE being touched in the belly. Also, he will probably not eat

and may have a fever. This condition can lead to shock and even death if untreated

If you know your pet has gotten into bones, call your vet as soon as possible. If your pet is not vomiting, the vet may have you feed a high-fiber diet and watch your pet for 24 hours to see if other symptoms occur. Or he may have you come into the clinic so he can X-ray your pet's belly to see exactly where the

In the Bakery Window ...

Leftover Thanksgiving Hash

by Rachael Ray - November 2010

Make use of leftovers to feed your pup his own Thanksgiving meal. Always check with your vet about which foods are appropriate for you to share with your pet.

3 Servings - Prep 10 min - Cook 5 min

Inaredients

1 sweet potato, peeled and coarsely chopped

- 1/2 cup leftover skinless roast turkey meat, shredded
- 1/2 cup leftover stuffing* or 1 piece toast, coarsely chopped

1 teaspoon finely chopped fresh sage

2 tablespoons prepared cranberry sauce



Directions:

boiling, salted water, cook the sweet potato until tender, about 5 minutes. Drain and let cool.

In a mixing bowl, stir together the sweet potato, turkey, stuffing and sage. Top with the cranberry sauce and serve.

*Do not use stuffing containing onions and /or garlic, which can be toxic to cats and dogs.

bones are. The vet is likely repeat the X-ray at some time later to make sure the bones are moving

Surgical removal

GOBBLE ...

If your pet has a blockage, he will need surgery. Bones that are caught in the esophagus may be removed with an endoscope (a flexible, fiberoptic scope that allows for surgery without an incision) under general anesthesia. If the esophagus is damaged, your vet may have to surgically repair it. Bones in the stomach can sometimes

> be removed by endoscopy; more commonly they are removed through traditional surgery by making an

incision in the stomach. Bones in the small intestine are always removed surgically.

If bones haven't gotten stuck by the time they reach the large intestine, they probably won't. But this doesn't mean that they won't cause a perforation. Bones that have made the trip all the way down the gastrointestinal tract sometimes get stuck at the rectum. These usually have to be removed with your dog under anesthesia, and the tissue has to be checked for injury and tears.

Dogs who need treatment for bone ingestion are often dehydrated, generally quite ill, by the time they get to surgery. They need IV fluid therapy during surgery and good monitoring afterward.

Summary

As you can see, turkey bones and pets definitely don't mix. So have a good Thanksgiving and Christmas and keep your pets safe either by taking your meat bones directly to the outside garbage, or by making sure your kitchen garbage container has a tight lid. It also helps to let holiday guests know you don't feed your dog anything from the table - least of all bones.

Luigi came to us on March 30, 2010. His Papa had died, and Luigi was taken from house to house to shelter, where they

realized he was going blind and deaf. But they contacted us because he was a feisty fella who had caught their hearts... that's the Italian in him. He is a good Catholic boy too, prayers before



every meal and wouldn't sleep with our Tina when we got her because they were not married and she would not convert.

His Papa had owned an Italian restaurant and carried Luigi about with him, so the story goes. Well, must be heaven is in need of a good Italian restaraunt because it is time now for Luigi to join his Papa.

He is about 15 or 16, blind, deaf, demented... but has been a joy and a treat, and many many lessons. But now he is having trouble eating and peeing by himself, so...

But he taught us and gave us so much in such a short span of time. He taught us a valuable lesson about being blind, deaf, and demented... small enclosed rooms are best, little movement of furniture, and ALWAYS keep the bed in the same spot. Always let him smell your hand before picking him up, always let him know you are there.

Most of all he helped turn Davin's little puppy mill Banjoe... who came to us so scared, under nourished, and frightened... he did not know how to walk, or pee, or eat. He thought he was a mouse, not a male dog. A few weeks with Luigi and he was peeing like a boy dog! Walking, though he still prefers staying inside or in Papa Davin's arms. He eats... boy does he know that one! And does not hide when someone comes in the room anymore, will even let you pick him up, although he is cautious still. They eat, sleep, pee, and do everything together now. He is sure going to miss his buddy.

Over the last 6 months or so, Banjoe has traded places with Luigi, going from the frightened one, to the one that gets out of bed and guides Luigi back to it in the middle of the night. The one who stands between any human that might hurt Luigi (Banjoe's terms on this are rather vague) and Luigi himself, to protect him. Now when I pick Luigi up, Banjoe flips out if Luigi squeals or grumbles,

as he is often known to do.

It has been a sweet and loving process to be a part of... but now it is time.

He got very close to my husband John, and to Davin, but I really don't believe he ever

Barks and growls a bit at first when the new dogs come in, but settles down quickly and is friendly to everyone. When he is in his crate during parts of the class, he is very quiet and well-behaved. He is a dream in the car. Lies down in his crate and doesn't make a peep. Unbelieveable.

Today, I took Moki to an all-breed dog show in Aliquippa, PA, which is only 20 minutes from us. I go to this show every year. It is a nice, small show with a casual feel, compared to some of the bigger ones I attend. No one checks you out as you walk onto the grounds, so you can bring an un-entered dog with no problem. I brought Moki, and made sure we arrived in time to see the Papillons being judged. It was pretty comical, seeing Moki next to the show Paps! He looked like a Papillon on steroids! He was very wellbehaved, though, and greeted every person and dog we met with enthusiasm. I wanted to go so that he would experience something close to what it will be like at an agility trial, and was so pleased that he handled it like a pro. After we left, I took him to Pet Supplies Plus to exchange a harness I had recently bought for him that turned out to be too small. He was great there, too, and afterwards, we took advantage of the nice weather and sat at the outdoor tables outside of Panera Bread. I had his water bowl with me, and he sat there getting clicks and treats for lying down and being calm amidst the passers by and the

parking lot traffic. Several people stopped to see him, and he gave everyone kisses. He also had a lot of fun trying to stalk the House Sparrows which were hopping around the place!

Moki sleeps in his crate in Brendan's room at night, and is out with me during the day, only being crated when I have to leave or if we are eating. The only behavior issue we are having is his enthusiasm for food: namely, he will find and eat ANY food in the house before we can blink, whether it is in another animal's bowl, has been dropped on the floor by accident, is on a plate on an end table, or even ON THE DINING ROOM TABLE! Last Wednesday, he jumped up onto the dining room table and stole some pizza crust. So I quickly removed all the plates, as everyone was finished eating, and before I could turn around, I found him dragging a WHOLE SLICE OF PIZZA across the floor. After he finished the crust, and while I was taking the plates out to the kitchen, he had jumped back up onto the dining room table, OPENED THE PIZZA BOX, and stolen one of the two remaining slices. I couldn't believe it. (Lest you think I'm angry, I'm laughing right now.) A couple of weeks before that, at Brendan's birthday party, he stole half of one of the guest's sandwiches right off of his plate AS I WAS HAND-ING THE PLATE to the boy. The child was sitting on the floor, with his back against the couch, and as I handed him his plate, Moki jumped up, grabbed the sandwich, and started gulping it down. It was rather embarrassing, as I'm supposed to be a dog trainer! Ha!

Moki is so food obsessed, you would think we don't feed him. But he gets his 1/3 cup of Natural Balance twice a day, plus extra in the form of training treats. And he has put on just a little bit of weight since we got him (not much, but he feels like he has a litte more padding over his ribs), so I'm more worried that he's eating too much, not too little. (I will cut back if necessary; I promise not to let him become overweight. None of my other animals are, by the way, so we do not overfeed.) He has growled at us a few times when we try to take away some food he has stolen, so this is definitely something I need to work on. (Last week, I caught him with a half-eaten apple that he had just stolen from Brendan. He actually snapped at me when I tried to take it away. I know you probably find that hard to

believe, but he did. I just gave him a firm, "That's enough!" and that was the end of it. Most often, though, we can take things away without a problem.)

We have taken to lifting up the other animals' food before letting Moki out of his crate, as the first thing he does is run to Gracie's and Liza's bowls to see if he can scarf up any of their food, even if he has just eaten his own meal five minutes ago. So I went from a dog I can hardly get to eat, Gracie, to a dog who will eat anything! This is definitely a case of "be careful what you wish for." Ha ha. The worst part is that Moki does not seem to care much WHAT he eats, and if we don't watch him, will "snack" from the cat's litter box! Yuck. We scoop every day and keep it clean, but he doesn't miss a chance to try. I've had lots of training clients whose dogs did this, but this is the first time I've had to deal with it myself. How on earth that can taste good to a dog is beyond me! My real fear, however, is that someday, someone will drop a pill on the ground and he will inhale it before we can retrieve it. I have lectured everyone in the house to be careful about medication, as this is my worst nightmare. I have attached a couple of recent photos of Moki. I have more, but as I said before, I can't seem to figure out how to re-size them in gmail (I could do that when I used Outlook), so they are such large files and images, and I don't want to crash your system. I have a Picassa account, but haven't had time to figure out how to use it yet. When I figure it out, I will put a bunch of photos together and post them there so you can view them.

Thanks for checking in, Jan. And I want to thank you once again for all of the love and care you gave to Moki. He is a wonderful dog, and you are largely responsible for that, I'm sure. Talk to you again soon.
